# Once upon a time



The old terminology of revolutionary ideology, defined when the technology at the disposal of modern capitalism was undreamt of, has proved hopelossly inadequate. Like a fundamentalist preacher trying to come to terms with space travel, we are caught trying to make the new conditions fit the old analysis.

To attempt a description of these new conditions Henri Lefebure suggested "The Spectacle" as an ad hoc term - a term later defined and analysed

McAllen's police force installed a video-camera in its headquarters' interrogation room in the early 1970s. The purpose, ironically, was to protect officers against trumped-up brutality charges.

In two-fisted Texas, however, with its long history of anti-Mexican oppression, the camera became a 'training tool' that inspired grim competition. Night after night, officers gathered to watch playbacks of themselves beating- up drunks and other alleged lawbreakers. In one tape, five officers take turns at attacking an unresisting, handcuffed young man. He is lifted by pants, belt and hair, then dropped face-down on the cement. floor. His arms are wrenched until he screams. His head is smashed time after time into a table top. Amid volleys of obscenity, he is punched, slapped and kicked as he lies pleading for mercy.

fall the events in human history, the one to attract the largest audience was not a great political occasion, nor a special celebration of some complex achievement in the arts or sciences, but a simple ball-game - a soccer match. On a June day in 1978, it is claimed that more than 1,000 million people tuned in to the World Cup Final between Argentina and Holland. This means that something like onequarter of the entire world population stopped whatever they were doing and focused their attention on a small natch of grass in South America where 22 brightly clad figures were kicking a ball about in a frenzy of effort and concentration.

The very essence of the spectacle is that the spectator should remain passively receptive towards the whole design, however frenzied he is in the pursuit of a particular spectacular myth or fashion.

# Recuperation



The 500 sites are regarded as having the potential of a Flix-borough disaster. The chemical plant at Flixborough on Humberside exploded in 1974, killing 28 people. The safety executive will not publicly identify the sites, it says, because of security and because legislation prevents the giving of commercial information to third parties.

Privately, some executive officials acknowledge their fear that, were the list to be publicised, residents near the sites would press for the installations to be closed down. They are also concerned that there would be a public demand for other smaller sites to be regarded as major hazards—and the executive does not have enough inspectors to cope. In the mistaken belief that it is "their" street or "their" town, they seem to think they should have some say in the activities of local industry.

Rapid transit systems allow the workforce to be drawn from a wider area. It also allows for centralisation of production, standardisation, monopoly and control. But no matter how rapid those transit systems are - ne never seem to catch up with ourselves.

specific areas and specific times for specific activities. 

A great place for business

The temporal and spatial segregation of activities aids social control. When in a 'work' place during 'work' time we begin to behave accordingly and surrender our desires, hopes, dignity and even our health to the 'reality' of the situation.

Have you ever wondered what it's like to work in a factory making semiconductors?

Is it exciting to work with high technology, to wear sparkling white coveralls and bounce along down brightly lit sterile corridors, as if you were in Space Station Alpha?

The reality, of course, is a little different. Marconi Electronic Devices (MEDL) recently opened — if that is the right phrase — the largest clean room in the country in its Lincoln factory.

The 12,500 square foot clean room, positioned in the middle of the factory, is impressive. Wafer fabrication continues in a quiet, cool, sterile environment.

And on the subject of things sterile, the ion implantation room is not for those who would like offspring.

Over two thirds of MEDL's staff are women. They are overwhelmingly employed in packaging integrated circuits

The space age image of the factory hides many boring and repetitive jobs: We have to use women, although I suppose in the future we will be using machines. he added.

'Its really boring,' said one woman. 'My eyes hurt after looking down the microscope all day. I would like to do some of the other packaging jobs, it would be more interesting,' she added.

The technical expert was unmoved: 'They learn to do one job, and get good at it. I don't see why they want to do other jobs as well,' he then added. It is hardly surprising that the illusion of 'free' time is so attractive.

The Home Office is to test a new form of high-powered strobe gun designed for riot control.

The gun, shaped like a large hairdryer, causes a wide range of effects, from momentary distraction to severe nausea and headaches.

In some individuals it can cause a mild form of epilepsy. Light-sensitive people can be thrown into a fit.

The gun is one of many antiriot devices which are regularly tested at the Police Scientific Development Branch equipment laboratory in St Albans, Herts,

Several witnesses including Fleet Street photographers reported another telling incident. A group of plain clother men were seen hurrying from Brixton police station armed with pick-axe handles bound with black insulation tape. Uniformed police tried to stop them going off to war with these implements. They were disregarded.

...... and who is on their side?

The Brixton fighting had a traumatic effect.

They say that their command structure was in disarray. Among the stories which are now being bitterly repeated is a suggestion that some senior officers removed their own epaulettes so that they would not be targets for the rioters and thus made it impossible for junior officers to know who was supposed to be in charge.

Recent events must have shown those who choose to serve power - when puch comes to shove - just how for they can rely on their "superiors".

# Fragmentation

Because oppression is delegated down the power pyramid through specialists, oppression itself is specialized. While me are highly motivated to attack the oppression that pinches us most, if we concentrate solely on our own particular (specialized) oppression we play into the hands of the specialists of power.

Fighting one oppression we must never lose sight of the fact that it is only part of the total oppression.

Fragmentary resistance may win us some improvement in our own position, we may even win a victory — but for every head we cut off, the monster grows a new one in another place.



Behind the pathetic search for new political parties to join, gurus to follow, gods to worship, new consumer goods, new experiences and new 'alternatives' is avery real need to break out of the Society of the Spectacle (if only for an hour a week).

Sterile and harmful action is whatever reinforces the passivity of the masses, their apathy, their cynicism, their differentiation through hierarchy, their alienation, their reliance on others to do things for them and the degree to which they can therefore be manipulated by others - even by those allegedly acting on their behalf."
